**NEW MINIMUM WAGES ACCEPTED**

The White Paper on the subject of the Minimum Wage Advisory Board for the industrial sector in the Uganda area is published in the Uganda Gazette. It is the result of the recommendations of the Board which was set up in 1957. It also sets out the minimum wages in various industries in the country. The industries covered are: Textiles, Paper, Printing, Bookbinding, Furniture, Metalwork, Engineering, Transport, and other related industries. The minimum wages are set at various levels depending on the industry and the skill level of the workers.

**Monthly**

The monthly wage for unskilled workers in the industrial sector is set at 10 shillings per month. For semi-skilled workers, it is 12 shillings, and for skilled workers, it is 15 shillings. These wages are subject to revision based on the cost of living index.

"There is no question of the Government trying to extend its control over the federal states or diminish the status given to them at the London Conference," he said.

He said that the Bill would ensure that the federal states would have a say in their own affairs, while still remaining part of a united Uganda.
